A: No! Eggs were used for making poultices for horses. **B**: Yes! Bran, though not eaten in great quantities, was a part of a medieval warhorse's diet. **C**: Yes! Horsebread was made up of ground legumes that were baked into bread and could be taken on campaign. **D**: Yes! Oats were a huge part of the diet of warhorses, especially destriers. **E**: No! But bacon fat was used to treat horses hooves. **F**: Yes! Grass and fodder make up a huge part of horses' diets today. **G**: No! Honey was used for treating and cleaning wounds, but was not fed to the horses. **H**: No! Horses might have a sweet tooth, but sugar is bad for their teeth, and was very rare and expensive in the Middle Ages. **I**: No! Garlic was used in medicinal treatments but not fed to horses. **J**: Yes! Hay made up a huge proportion of the warhorse's diet. **K**: No! Vinegar, made with wine or perhaps even apples, was used for cleaning wounds and making bandages for horses.
